## PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2015

In 2015 Encino-Tarzana Branch continued to be one of the busiest of the 72 branches in the city - consistently ranking among the top three in circulation.

Friends' support of this Branch Library in 2015 included:

- \* We funded books, supplies, and equipment beyond what is provided by the City Budget
- \* We funded Adult, Children's, and Teen's programs including paying for performers at Summer Reading Club events
- \* We purchased a rug for story time and provided puppets for the puppet stage which was provided by the Library
- \* We funded Hot-Off-The-Press books at the maximum level of 25 new books per month
- \* We continue to pay for a movie license
- \* We provide funding for the very popular Yoga classes

All of this is possible largely due to our very successful Book Sales and the incredible crew led by Norma Lamken and Margaret Talvin. We continue to earn near record-breaking amounts. Every Tuesday and Friday the sorting crew arrives to find a huge stack of donated books which they sort into boxes by subject ready to be set up at the next book sale; they also restock the Bookstore and rotate and refresh the inventory. *[continues >]*

Our annual Membership Drive headed up by Membership Chair Jenny Lapidus also contributes significantly to our income and our ability to serve the Library and the community.

Our website continues to be a marvel with information updated almost daily by Webmaster Judy Russell and Publications Chair Barbara Leff. Barbara also writes our bi-annual informative Newsletter.

I look forward to continuing to serve the Library and the Community in 2016.

### **USED BOOK SALES**

Book sale proceeds have been generally going up since 2009.

Are there patterns that determine what makes a book sale successful? We've been keeping records from 2009 to our current 2016. Why is one book sale more successful than another? Maybe the August sales are more successful, or maybe it's the number of boxes of books that we have to put into the sale. And it might be interesting to note if we get more donations during March than in June.

Unfortunately, we've come to the conclusion that there really isn't a pattern on any of the above. So much for record keeping! It doesn't seem to matter if we have a lot of books or a few books, although we've learned that we need between 150 to 300 boxes of books for a good sale. Less than that and the sale looks sparse. More than that and we don't have space to put all of the boxes out. Other things obviously come into play – things that are hard to quantify: The quality of the books that come in for a particular sale or how motivated the buyers are. And then there are the attractive signs pointing out where to find the various genre.

Sometimes we are overwhelmed with a windfall, a really large donation of books of one particular genre, so many that they need a special table to display. Advertised, these books bring people in. We've received huge donations of cookbooks, LP records, and more recently, books for collectors – Easton Press, Folio Society, etc. We have received and featured smaller but significant donations of books on the Early West, Haiku, and Native Americans. We are most grateful for all of the donations.

It's always a challenge to sort through, organize, and display all of these books to best effect. It's gratifying to watch people who immediately go to the featured genre – and then shop for other books.

We have a wonderful cadre of dedicated volunteers who enjoy working together and seeing the benefits. We thank them for all of the time, effort, and caring they give to the Friends.

"Coloring for Adults" is a fun and relaxing workshop. It is also a wonderfully easy way to tap into your innate creativity as you choose colors to complete free coloring pages.

This workshop is presented by a Friends' volunteer, Monica Moran aka The Creative Beast. Monica is a mixed media artist, seamstress, and book artist who enjoys volunteering with FOL. She also helps with our FOL book sales – sorting and selling.

Monica is a firm believer in the positive benefits of all forms of creativity. She is excited to be offering this workshop for our Library and is looking forward to helping more adults discover the benefits of creativity through the simple medium of coloring.

This workshop is offered FREE to all, with coloring pages and coloring pencils available for creative play, thanks to the support of the Friends of the Encino-Tarzana Library.

Articles on the benefits of coloring for adults are also provided, as well as a resource list for those who want to explore coloring on their own, including information about various brands of coloring pencils and coloring markers, and websites to find free coloring pages.

This workshop is held on the first Monday of each month, from 6pm to 7pm. ## **HOT-OFF-THE-PRESS BOOKS**

HOTP are located on the "NEW BOOKS" shelves, next to the Information Desk. HOTP may be borrowed for seven days and must be returned to this Library. HOTP cannot be reserved or renewed. (However, you may reserve titles through the Library's larger collection and "Hold" system.)

The expensive subscription to HOTP Books of 25 books a month is a gift from Friends of Encino-Tarzana Library. Selection and acquisition of books is explained on our webpage. Librarians notify the Friends when HOTP Books are received and placed on shelves; we immediately date and list them on our website.

### **LIBRARY REPORT FOR ENCINO-TARZANA BRANCH**

Spring and summer are busy times at the Library. As the school year ends, we see more and more students in the branch. There are children, with their parents and caretakers, often studying with tutors; and middle school, high school, and college students writing end of the term reports and studying for exams. From a Library staff perspective, this is the time of year that we are wrapping up our materials purchasing for this fiscal year and budget planning for the next. One aspect of current budget planning that is encouraging is that we are seeing more money coming to the Los Angeles Public Library as a result of Measure L and the strengthening of the local economy. Additionally, we receive very generous funding from the Friends of the Encino-Tarzana Library, which greatly supplements our City budget.

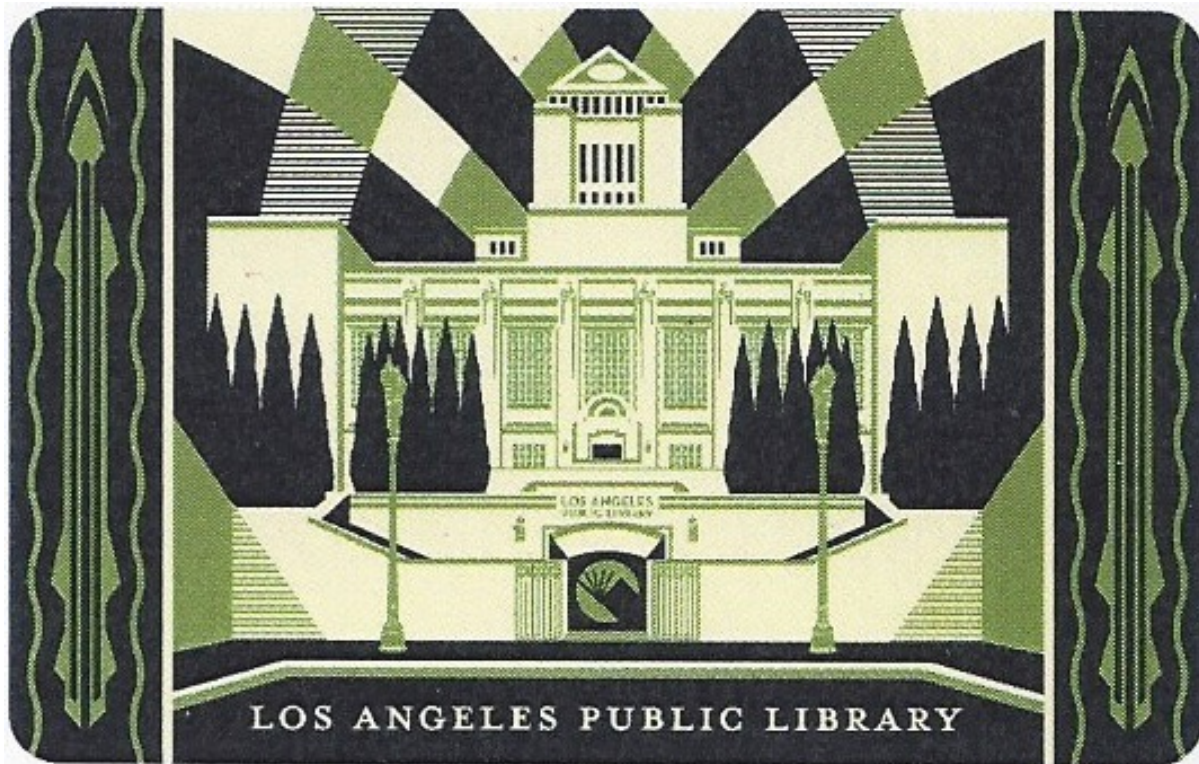
Summer Reading Club is just around the corner, and this year's theme is "Read for the Win." We encourage all of our young patrons to sign up and enjoy not only the small prizes they earn for reading, but the reading itself. It is a program that is designed solely for the purpose of fun. This year, for the first time ever, the Library is introducing a **Summer Reading Club for Adults**. The roll-out won't be as big as for children and teens, and the club won't be active at all branches, but throughout the system we will be encouraging adults to sign up, receive a small gift for their effort, and either read along with their children, or read books that they enjoy. All those interested can get information about the Adult Summer Reading Club at their local branch, or on the [Los Angeles Public Library Website](#) as summer nears.

But before Summer Reading Club kicks off, the Library celebrates Asian-American Pacific Islander Heritage Month in May, and LGBT Heritage Month in June. For Asian-American Pacific Islander Month, the Encino-Tarzana Branch presents *Hula 'Ohana*, on Wednesday, May 25, 2016, at 6:00 pm. This celebration and performance of Hawaiian dance and culture appears for the second time at our branch and is again made possible by the generous support of the Friends of the Encino-Tarzana Branch Library. Programs for LGBT Heritage Month in June include a dramatic reading by local actor Arnie Weiss and a screening of an LGBTQIA-interest film. **MAYOR ERIC GARCETTI AND ARTIST SHEPARD FAIREY  
UNVEIL L.A.'s FIRST ARTIST-DESIGNED LIBRARY CARD**

LOS ANGELES (April 19, 2016) – Mayor Eric Garcetti, artist Shepard Fairey, City Librarian John F. Szabo, and L.A. Cultural Affairs General Manager Danielle Brazell were joined by students from the Downtown Magnets High School for the unveiling of L.A.'s first limited-edition, artist-designed library card today at the Central Library. The card launch concludes the library's celebration of National Library Week. Designed by artists Shepard Fairey and Cleon Peterson, the new library card is now available at all 73 locations of the Los Angeles Public Library (LAPL). The design features an illustration of the historic Central Library, which is celebrating it in 2016.

"Our city is the creative capital of the world -- and this collaboration between the Los Angeles Public Library and Shepard Fairey is a great expression of how art can enliven our civic institutions," said Mayor Eric Garcetti. "It is a beautiful design that will raise awareness about the wealth of resources that our libraries offer, free of charge, to Angelenos of all ages and in every community."

Fairey is renowned for his iconic "HOPE" portrait of Barack Obama and OBEY GIANT art campaign. His works are in the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), Victoria & Albert Museum and the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery, among other institutions.

"We are thrilled to have L.A.'s own Shepard Fairey and Cleon Peterson reimagine our library card," said City Librarian John Szabo, "and increase awareness of the only card that lets you access more than six million books and other items in the library's collection, as well as download e-books and music, stream movies, get online homework help, earn a high school diploma, and much, much more—and all for free." *[continues >]*

The L.A.-based artist, a long-time supporter and advocate for the Los Angeles Public Library, stated, "My wife Amanda and I believe in the value of libraries to provide resources for the public, especially those who can't afford decent computers or an extensive book collection. When I was younger, I did most of my research for art and design at the library. The L.A. Public Library system also has great tutoring and summer reading programs that are free to the public, and a needed supplement to our underfunded school system."

Fairey and Peterson's library card design is based on an illustration created to promote the Library Foundation of Los Angeles's Young Literati Annual Toast fundraiser. Fairey and his wife Amanda also have supported the library and foundation in many other ways: Shepard has participated as a celebrity reader and even deejayed at Young Literati events, and Amanda is a member of the foundation board and chair of Young Literati.

A 2015 recipient of the nation's highest honor for library service—the National Medal from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, the Los Angeles Public Library serves the largest and most diverse urban population of any library in the nation. Its Central Library, 72 branch libraries, collection of more than 6 million books, state-of-the-art technology accessible at [www.lapl.org](http://www.lapl.org), and more than 18,000 public programs a year provide everyone with free and easy access to information and the opportunity for life-long learning.
